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President's Message by Tom Adams:

As I sit here in Southern Pines writing these thoughts on a beautiful 70-degree day, it is hard to believe it is the Third of December. Every day that we spend in this beautiful area we call the Sandhills is a gift from God. I thank him for this privilege.

The other reason it is hard to believe it is December is that the legislature is still in session in Raleigh! The Speaker, Tim Moore (R Cleveland) has indicated the legislators will be returning to Raleigh on January 3rd making the 2021 the longest session in our state's history. The members have now completed a state budget for the biennium that has been signed by the Governor, a major win for the Republican led legislature. They have also enacted plans for legislative and congressional redistricting. The Governor would have vetoed the redistricting plans if he had that authority, he does not. Good.

The budget which covers the next two years contains 52.9 Billion in funding. About half of that number is spent on Medicaid leaving about 25 billion to fund roads, schools, teacher pay raises and other items. Let's be clear here, Governor Roy Cooper hates this budget. Every indicator coming out of Raleigh says that he badly wanted to veto the legislation because it does not spend enough! He wanted to expand Medicaid, higher raises for teachers and state employees and more money for most state programs. It's not in the bill. Good.

When former Governor Jim Martin went into office he struggled to get people to understand how he was going to be a different sort of governor from all the democrats who had gone before him and in particular how he was different from his immediate predecessor, Jim Hunt who never saw a dollar he didn't want to spend. Martin hit on the idea of calling his new conservative agenda "Constructive Conservatism". When I look at this budget that's what I see.

The conservative elements are unmistakable. State spending will, once again, grow no faster than the combined rates of inflation and population increase. The budget initiates another round of pro-growth tax cuts that, when fully implemented, will reduce our tax rate on personal income to 3.99%, down

from 5.25% and eliminate our corporate tax altogether.

Lowering taxes while controlling spending. That in itself is a significant conservative victory. The budget's expansion of the Opportunity Scholarship program for families choosing private schools for their children means the pressure for reform in how we teach our children in traditional schools will continue to mount. Regarding the constitutional separation of powers, the bill clarifies that the governor does not possess the unilateral power to declare perpetual emergencies. After 30 days, an emergency declaration goes away unless extended by a vote of the Council of State.

I am also pleased to see language that clarifies that the attorney general cannot steal legislative prerogatives by unilaterally moving to "settle" lawsuits against the General Assembly to achieve a policy outcome that the attorney general may like but lawmakers do not. All good.

In short there is a lot in this budget for conservative Republicans to like. Our State Senator Tom McGinnis played a major role in shaping the final budget product as did Representative Jamie Boles. They continue the tradition of solid conservative Republican representation from Moore County to our state. Good.

As we enter the Christmas season, I take a moment to give thanks to God for our lives here in the Sandhills of North Carolina. I look at our rolling terrain, watch the towering pines bending in the warm southern wind and see the commerce of the golfing industry continue to grow, it reminds me every day of the bounty God has given us in this place and time. Merry Christmas and a prosperous 2022 to you and yours.

Tom Beddow, Moore County Republican Party Chair has been watching the State Redistricting



plans for the US House, the NC State House and Senate seats. Also of note are the changes in Moore County Board of Commissioners for next year's election.

The 2022 election will see a number of changes for Moore County residents. See the maps which show the new districts for North Carolina and Moore

County, following these remarks.

Moore County will now be entirely in the new 8th US Congressional district and Dan Bishop will run for reelection in the new district. Richard Hudson will

run in the new 10^{th} US House District to our northwest.

Moore will now be part of the 21st NC senate district which includes a good chunk of Cumberland. Senator McInnis will run for reelection in that district.

Moore will now have three NC House districts. Rep. Sauls, Republican from Lee County will now have Carthage, Vass and Cameron.

Alan McNeill will not be running, so the new vacant district will extend from Randolph County further south into Moore and will include Pinehurst. That State Representative will be decided in the November 2022 election.

Jamie Boles will have a primary against fellow Republican Ben Moss. That district will include Southern Pines, Aberdeen, the lower tier of Moore, and all of Richmond County.

County Commission and School Board districts will also be changing for the 2022 elections. Combined with the US Senate race this all adds up to another critical election year in 2022 with the potential to recapture a US Senate majority, an additional 2-3 seats in the US House in NC and that majority, and super majorities in the NC House and Senate.

Candidate filing for 2022 races opens Dec. 6-17 and the primary will take place on March 8 for those races with more than one Republican.



U.S. Slips in Economic Freedom Rankings; Canada in Freefall



Here is a historical view from the article below:

"The U.S. had ranked in the top five for the past two years. In 1980 and 1990, America had ranked as high as No. 2."

Note that Venezuela is the lowest ranked in the world and "Canada is [sic] in Freefall."

According to a 2016 Whorton School of Business, University of Pennsylvania Report and I quote (emphasis added):

"We are seeing in Venezuela the convergence of the trends of economic deterioration, political deterioration, the collapse of public order, and energy shortages; so it is really across the board," he notes, adding that the country's normal challenges have been "exacerbated by 10 years of horrific economic mismanagement done to prop up a political system that depended essentially on hand-outs and a kind of state socialism."

It appears to me, to be the same trends we saw in Venezuela are starting to show up in the US.

These US trends are just one more reason we need to come together and work hard at the 2022 and 2024 elections

U.S. Slips in Economic Freedom Rankings; Canada in Freefall - Carolina Journal

With an ever-expanding federal government, the U.S. has fallen out of the top five countries for economic freedom, according to a new report from the Fraser Institute.

America now ranks as No. 6, behind Hong Kong, Singapore, New Zealand, Switzerland, and Georgia. The U.S. ranked particularly poorly in its size of government and freedom to trade internationally.

The Fraser Institute ranks countries annually based on nearly four dozen measures of economic freedom. The highest-rated countries score well for "protection of privately owned property, a legal system that treats all equally, even-handed enforcement of contracts, and a stable monetary environment," according to the report.

Taxes must also be low, international trade available without onerous barriers, and allocate resources by free markets rather than government distribution.

High-ranking countries for economic freedom have a higher GDP per capita, higher incomes, less poverty, and longer life expectancy. Economic freedom is associated with faster economic growth and increased social mobility, as well, allowing people at the bottom of the income spectrum to rise to the middle class or above.

The U.S. had ranked in the top five for the past two years. In 1980 and 1990, America had ranked as high as No. 2.

"Where people are free to pursue their own opportunities and make their own choices, they lead more prosperous, happier and healthier lives," said Fred McMahon, research chair in economic freedom at the Fraser Institute, in a statement.

While the U.S. slipped in this year's rankings, America's neighbor to the north is in free fall. Canada now ranks No. 14 after years in the top 10. The Fraser Institute cited increasing taxes and regulation for Canada's drop in the rankings.

Hong Kong's top ranking was based primarily on a small central government, low regulations, sound fiscal policy and easy access to international trade.

The lowest-rated countries are primarily in Africa and the Middle East: Central African Republic, Democratic Republic of Congo, Syria, Republic of Congo, Iran, Zimbabwe, Algeria, Libya and Sudan. Venezuela came in last.

Apparently, there is nothing partisan about nonchalance toward "Critical Race Theory" as a continuous anti-American thread woven into social studies curricula. But there he was, Pinehurst Mayor John Strickland, recently claiming council members Boesch and Drum committed "ethics violations" on the flimsiest charges since the Steele Dossier was used to target Donald Trump's presidency. In the case of Drum, the charge was made weeks ahead of his re-election bid on November 2. Drum lost to a pair of first-time, novice candidates, including Strickland crony Patrick Pizzella.

Krueger made the fatal mistake of accepting a nomination to become President of the Moore Republican Women's club, an award winning club regionally and nationally, and the state's largest. The spouse of the current district attorney, Michael Hardin, whom Krueger did not endorse in 2020, mounted an expensive campaign to oppose Krueger for the club presidency. In a secret-ballot election on November 3 Krueger received two-thirds of the vote to easily secure the position. But if she was trying to sow seeds of division in the club, Victoria Hardin also scored a victory, perverse though it was.

Republicans at all levels of government have to figure out how to be more skeptical of the many frauds who slither into our midst. Consider the 13 House Republicans who last week voted in favor of the Biden administration's \$1 trillion "infrastructure" bill that will allocate a scant \$110 billion for legitimate infrastructure projects (*The Wall Street Journal*, November 8, 2021).

The Village Council's perversion may yet bring down its conspirators. Boesch, whose ethics violation is alleged to be talking to a village employee without permission, correctly sensed that Strickland and two fellow council members colluded to prepare a statement denouncing her before a scheduled October public meeting. Member Jane Hogeman was reading "her" statement rather matter-of-factly when Boesch interrupted to ask who had authored it. Hogeman was caught off guard and soon acknowledged that it has been "passed around".


